



INTRODUCTION



Table Tennis Review (TTR) is introduced by ITTF, to give players the right to review a decision made by an umpire, which they believe is incorrect.

With the help of highly accurate technology it will be possible to have a point replayed instantly and reviewed by a video match official, who will have the authority to overturn the original decision based on the evidence.

TTR PROCEDURE



- 1. The players are informed before the match starts whether TTR is available.
- 2. The umpire takes a decision and awards the point accordingly.
- 3. The player who is faulted or not awarded a point can request TTR by calling "TTR" or "Review".
- 4. The request for TTR must be made as soon as possible after the umpire awards the point and before the start of the next rally.
- 5. The TTR will only be specific for the reason of fault i.e. toss height.
- 6. The umpire requests the TTR with a signal, indicating a square with the hands.

TTR PROCEDURE



- 7. The TTR crew replays the point in question in the TTR monitor room and the in-venue screens.
- 8. The TTR match official validates and makes the final decision on the point.
- 9. The final decision appears on the TTR replay.
- 10. The umpire confirms or changes the decision accordingly.
- 11. Each player/pair have up to two (2) reviews per match. One (1) review at a time will be deducted if the player(s)' review was unsuccessful.

TTR starts with replays in the TTR room and in-venue screens




TTR Match Official validates and makes final decision

TTR replay or visual with decision displayed in the venue screens




EXAMPLE 2 - EDGE BALL









EXAMPLE 6 – SERVICE TOSS ANGLE

DISCLAIMER



- TTR will be introduced in selected events.
- At this initial phase of TTR, a player can only request TTR for decisions made by the umpire which directly affect the player with a fault or awarded point against. Example. A player cannot request TTR in case an umpire has not called a fault service for the opponent.
